Interesting Facts and Figures

In April of this year, the Bureau of Justice Statistics released the incarceration statistics for midyear 2004. The report stated that at that time, the Nation's prisons and jails incarcerated 2,131,180 persons. Prisoners in the custody of the 50 states and the Federal system accounted for two-thirds of the incarcerated population. The other third were held in local jails, not including persons in community based programs.

Minnesota does well as a state. We are the second lowest in the category of incarceration rate per 100,000 residents with 169 compared to Louisiana at number 1 with 814. While we have a low incarceration rate, we had the highest increase in growth of prison population with a 13.2% increase. These numbers represent prison growth and not jail growth.
